Subject: Your Life

Matthew 6:24-25,v33 – How selfish is your life?

People say, “Its my life, I can do what I want”. Jesus said, “[Seek ye first the kingdom of God](#)”- make it your number one priority.

A lot of people have issues in their life but the biggest issue should be what we do with Jesus Christ. The problem of sin is the greatest problem that man has to face. “[All seek their own things, not the things which are Jesus Christ's](#)” (Phil 2:21). He came for the good of others: “[The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost](#)” (Luke 19:10); “[Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners](#)” (1 Tim 1:15). He calls now, “[Seek ye the Lord while He may be found](#)”(Isa 55:6) and warns that “[It is time to seek the Lord](#)” (Hosea 10:12)

One day the gospel will be preached for the last time. The Lord Jesus has promised to come back for His own. Are you ready to go?

In a moment of time by simple faith you can repent of your sin, the thing that separates you from God.

He died on the cross of Calvary that we might be forgiven.

Many hope to be in heaven but don't do anything about it. There is an urgency and importance about the gospel message.

Colossians 3:1-3 – How secure is your life?

Those “[without Christ](#)” have “[no hope](#)” and are “[without God in the world](#)” (Eph 2:12). As opposed to those who can say that “[life is hid with Christ in God](#)”.

Many want personal and financial security but don't worry about eternal security.

Salvation involves a change, “[turned to God from idols](#)” (1 Thes 1:9), “[turned world upside down](#)” (Acts 17:6).

People are divided into saved (those delivered by putting faith and trust in Christ) and lost(those still on the broad way). You can start for heaven tonight by realising what He did at Calvary and confessing your sin and asking Him into your life.

James 4:13-14 – How short is your life?

Life is but a vapour so it is important to prepare and get right with God in time.

“[Remember Lot's wife](#)” (Luke 17:32): she was almost saved and ended up lost. She faced the judgment of God because she forgot that “[It is appointed unto men once to die and after this the judgment](#)” (Heb 9:27).

In Luke 12 we read of a farmer having a large crop who thought he could, “[take thine ease, eat drink and be merry](#)” (Luke 12:19). He took no thought of God. God would say of him, “[Thou fool, tonight thy soul shall be required of thee](#)” (Luke 19:20). All his plans came to nothing.
